



Sorting Sentences

I can separate the present perfect from the simple past.



1. Match the sentences below into **present perfect** and **simple past**.

The beginning of each sentence has been done for you.

Present Perfect	Simple Past
I have	She
She has	I
We have	The
She has	They
You have	He
The	We

I have watched a film.	She has listened to some music.
She walked.	She has swum.
We have eaten.	They thought.
You have eaten the apple.	He climbed a tree.
I read the magazine.	The door has broken.
The baby cried.	We talked.



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Remember, the present perfect uses:

have + past participle

(a verb ending in -ed or -en)

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I have watched a film.	She has listened to some music.
She walked.	She has swum.
We have eaten.	They thought.
You have eaten the apple.	Have you eaten the apple?
The baby cried.	The door has broken.
Has she finished?	We talked.

Challenge: Explain in one or two sentences how to spot the present perfect tense and how to spot the simple past tense.

Present perfect: The present perfect tense uses have + past participle (usually words ending in -ed or -en).

Simple past: This uses a pronoun (e.g. he) or noun followed by a past participle.
