WOW Day - Creating Aztec masks

As part of today's art session you will be creating your own paper versions of Aztec masks.



<u>Materials</u>

To create your masks you will need:

- One printed mask template or an a4 sheet of paper.
- Different pieces of coloured cards or coloured pencils.

Optional (if you have access to this material):

- A glue stick/sellotape/blu-tac
- A pair of scissors
- Tracing paper/baking paper (if you feel this will help you)
- A strip of white paper

<u>Your task</u>

Task 1: Choose your template.

Task 2: Have a think about your design. What materials? What shapes? What patterns? What colours? How can you make it look life-like? The information on the next two pages should give you some ideas.

Task 3: Collect your materials.

Task 4: If you are using a plain piece of paper, draw out your design.

Task 5: Get colouring or gluing and sticking!

Task 6: Cut out your template.

Optional: Attach your strip of white paper to the sides of your mask using glue or sellotape so you can wear it!



Being explorers, I would like to encourage you to be adventurous in your choice of materials, however I understand if this is not possible. For example, you could add plastic jewels or feathers to your design or you could use tin foil to represent silver. Do not be afraid to be creative!

Things to consider when creating your masks

Key features of Aztec art:

1) Realistic and life-like

A lot of Aztec art was inspired by people, animals and other creatures. The Aztec's valued the natural world and believed that it was *sacred* (had religious meaning).

2) Colourful

The Aztecs created some bright and beautiful designs. They regularly used blues, reds and greens in art.

3) Recurring patterns/shapes

Zig zags, circles and triangles featured in many Aztec designs.

4) Materials

Aztec masks were typically made out of turquoise stone (a shade of blue/green). Like many of their art creations, Aztec masks were mostly made from clay and other precious materials such as gold, silver and jewels. Feathers were sometimes added for decoration.






Miss Topley's example

- Red colouring pencil for red stone.
- Tin foil for silver.
