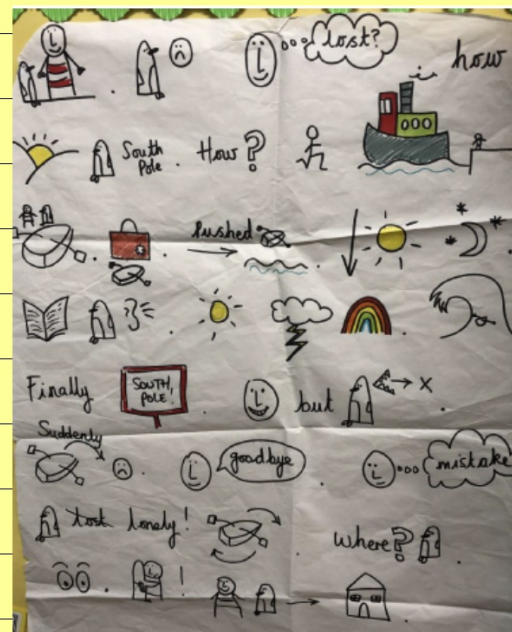

The middle of the story

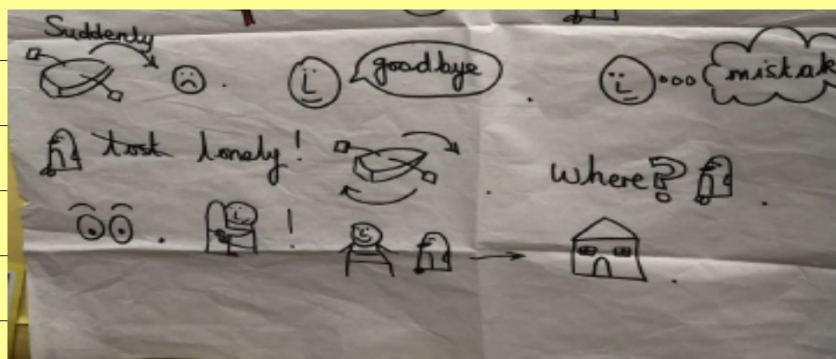

The ending of the story



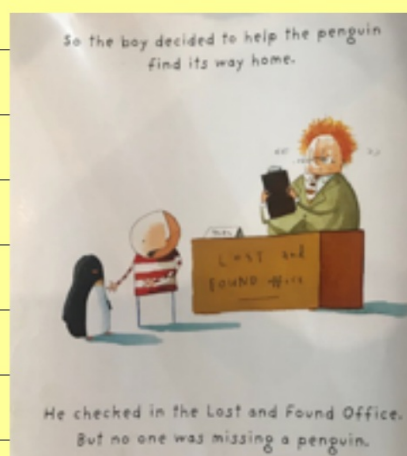
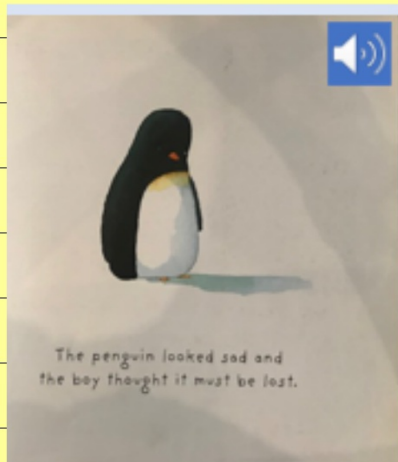

Thursday 14th January WALT:- To use past and present tense in my writing

The story Lost and Found is writing in the past tense. This means that the events in the story have already happened.

The words in the story that tell us whether it is set in the present or in the past are the verbs (doing/ action words)



Thursday 14th January WALT:- To use past and present tense in my writing

We can turn verbs into the present tense (happening now) by removing the suffix *ed* at the end of the word.

Past tense

helped

looked

asked

decided

ignored

Present tense

help

We can turn verbs into the past tense (already happened) by adding the suffix *ed* at the end of the word.

Present tense

help

check

float

want

ignore
