

The Tests

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- Key Stage 2 SATs take place nationally in the week commencing 11th May 2026.
- Statutory tests will be administered in the following subjects:
 - Punctuation, Vocabulary and Grammar (45 minutes)
 - Spelling (approximately 15 minutes)
 - Reading (60 minutes)
 - Mathematics
 - Paper 1: Arithmetic (30 minutes)
 - Paper 2: Reasoning (40 minutes)
 - Paper 3: Reasoning (40 minutes)
- All children will sit the same test.
- Each test will have scope for all pupils, including higher attaining pupils, to show their strengths.
- All tests are externally marked.
- Writing will be 'Teacher Assessed' internally.

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Scaled Scores

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- What is meant by 'scaled scores'?
- 100 will always represent the 'national standard'.
- Each pupil's raw test score will therefore be converted into a score on the scale, either at, above or below 100.
- The scale will have a lower end point somewhere below 100 and an upper end point of 120.
- A child who achieves the 'national standard' (a score of 100) will be judged to have demonstrated sufficient knowledge in the areas assessed by the tests.
- In July 2026 for the first publication of test results, each pupil will receive:
 - A raw score (number of raw marks awarded).
 - A scaled score in each tested subject.
 - Confirmation of whether or not they attained the national standard.

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Scaled Score Examples

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On publication of the test results in July 2026:

- A child awarded a scaled score of 100 is judged to have met the 'national standard' in the area judged by the test.
- A child awarded a scaled score of more than 100 is judged to have exceeded the national standard and demonstrated a higher than expected knowledge of the curriculum for their age.
- A child awarded a scaled score of less than 100 is judged to have not yet met the national standard and performed below expectation for their age.
- A child awarded a scaled score of 110 and above is judged to be working at a standard that is above that of the Expected standard and is working at a Higher 'Greater Depth' Standard.

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Spelling, Punctuation and Grammar

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- A test is given assessing understanding of Punctuation, Vocabulary and Grammar
- This test lasts for 45 minutes and includes approximately 50 questions requiring short answers or multiple-choice responses.
- A separate spelling test is administered containing 20 words, lasting approximately 15 minutes.
- Marks for these two tests are added together to give a total for Spelling, Punctuation and Grammar.

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Reading

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- The Reading Test consists of a single test paper with three unrelated reading texts.
- Children are given 60 minutes in total, which includes reading the texts and answering the questions.
- The texts get progressively harder as the children work through the booklet.
- A total of 50 marks are available.
- Questions are designed to assess the comprehension and understanding of a child's reading.
- Some questions are multiple choice or selected response, others require short answers and some require an extended response or explanation.

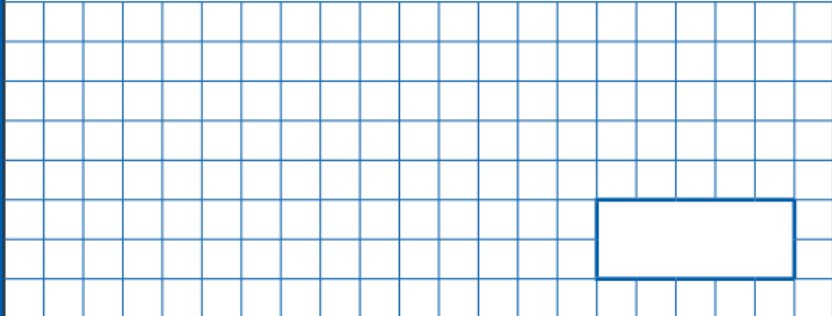
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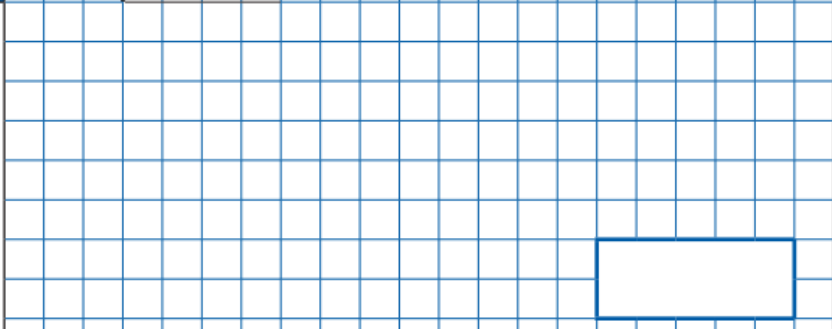
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- Children will sit three tests.
- Paper 1 is for 'Arithmetic' lasting for 30 minutes, covering calculation methods for all operations, including use of fractions, percentages and decimals.
- Questions gradually increase in difficulty, covering objectives that have been taught from Year 3 up to Year 6.
- Papers 2 and 3 cover 'Problem Solving and Reasoning', each lasting for 40 minutes.
- Pupils will still require calculation skills but will need to answer questions in context and decide what is required to find a solution.

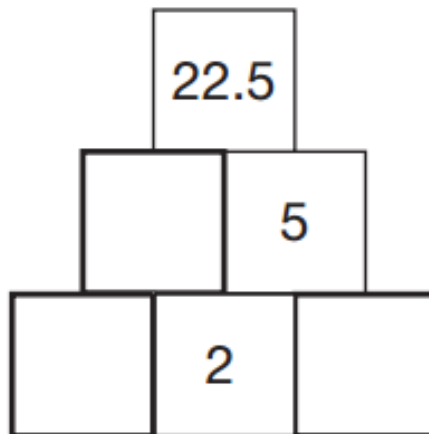

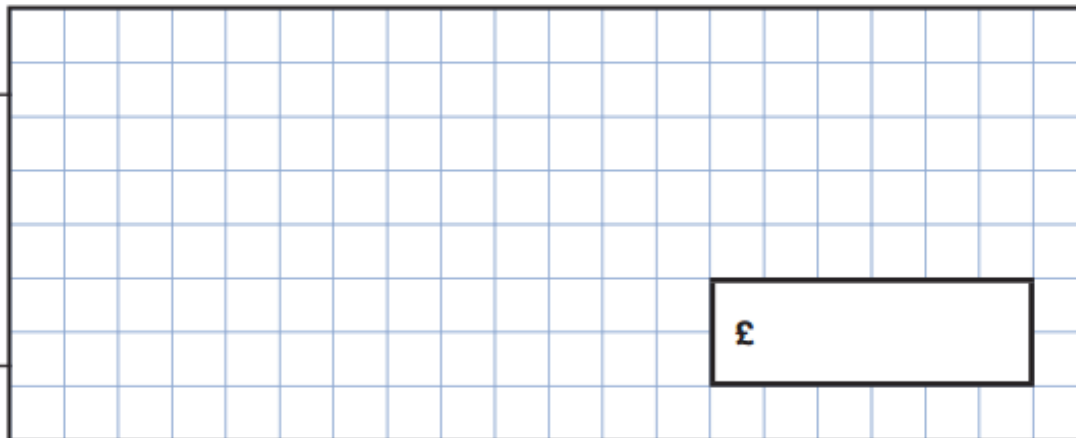

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How to Help Your Child

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- First and foremost, support and reassure your child that there is nothing to worry about and they should always just try their best. Praise and encourage!
- Ensure your child has the best possible attendance at school
- Support your child with any homework tasks.
- Reading, spelling and arithmetic (e.g. times tables) are always good to practise.
- Talk to your child about what they have learnt at school and what book(s) they are reading (the character, the plot, their opinion).
- Make sure your child has a good sleep and healthy breakfast every morning!



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How to Help Your Child with Maths

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- Play times tables games – Times Tables Rockstars
- Play mental maths games including counting in different amounts, forwards and backwards
- Encourage opportunities for telling the time
- Encourage opportunities for counting coins and money; finding amounts or calculating change when shopping
- Look for examples of 2D and 3D shapes around the home
- Identify, weigh or measure quantities and amounts in the kitchen or in recipes
- Play games involving numbers or logic, such as dominoes, card games, darts, draughts or chess

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How to Help Your Child with Reading

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- Listening to your child read can take many forms.
- First and foremost, focus developing an enjoyment and love of reading.
- Enjoy stories together – reading stories to your child at KS2 is equally as important as listening to your child read.
- Read a little at a time but often, rather than rarely but for long periods of time.
- Talk about the story before, during and afterwards – discuss the plot, the characters, their feelings and actions, how it makes you feel, predict what will happen and encourage your child to have their own opinions.
- Look up definitions of words together – you could use a dictionary, the internet or an app on a phone or tablet.
- All reading is valuable – it doesn't have to be just stories. Reading can involve anything from fiction and non-fiction, poetry, newspapers, magazines, football programmes, TV guides.
- Visit the local library - it's free!

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How to Help Your Child with Writing

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- Practise and learn weekly spelling patterns and the Year 5/6 words – make it fun!
- Encourage opportunities for writing such as letters to family or friends, shopping lists, notes or reminders, stories or poems.
- Write together – be a good role model for writing.
- Encourage use of a dictionary to check spelling and a thesaurus to find synonyms and expand vocabulary.
- Allow your child to use a computer for word processing, which will allow for editing and correcting of errors without lots of crossing out.
- Remember that good readers become good writers! Identify good writing features when reading (e.g. vocabulary, sentence structure, punctuation).
- Show your appreciation: praise and encourage, even for small successes!

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Spellcheckers are allowed!

Revision Schedules

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We will be sending home a revision schedule, like the example below for English and Maths. These will be individualised for each class so that we can focus on the gaps of the children and personalise the objectives we are teaching.

The revision schedules will tell you exactly what the children will be covering in class each week and give page references to the CGP guides should you wish to follow this up at home.

Please note that this is **NOT** a list of what we expect the children to do at home, simply suggestions of areas that they may find useful. You may wish to discuss with your child the areas from that week that they are least confident with, then use the overview to help you to decide what they need to revise / which pages to work through.

We will still be sending home their weekly homework tasks as usual.

will find this useful to develop their understanding and writing skills. We have included references to relevant pages in the CP6 KS2 English Study and Question books. We will also continue to send home additional grammar homework fortnightly.

Please note that this overview is subject to change as time spent on some topics may need extending or reducing to meet the needs of the children. However we hope that the information below will provide you with a point of reference at home to consolidate, support and extend your child's in-school learning.

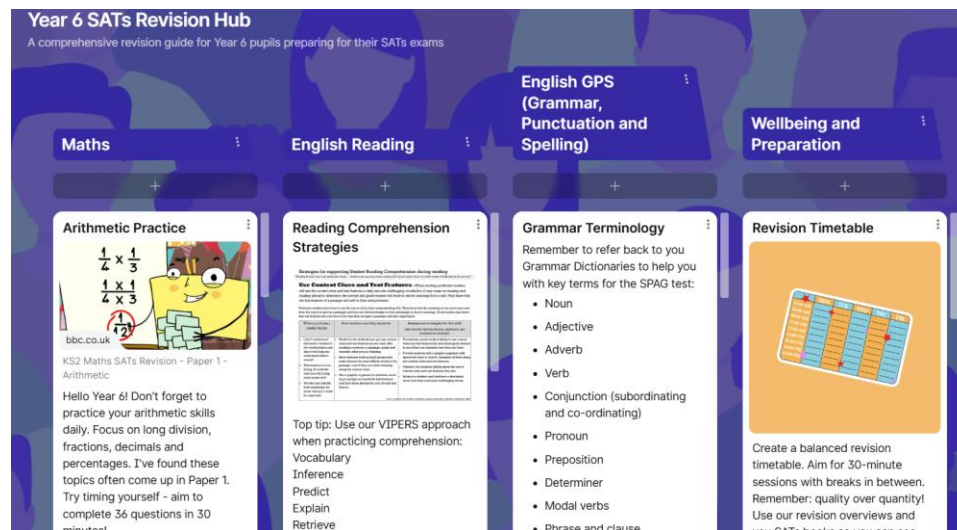
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We have set up a Year 6 SATs Revision Hub Padlet, where the children can find links to lots of games and resources to help them with their revision.
